Timing of Snowmelt: Why is it important and what do we know about it? **by** **Rob Van Kirk**

(Because of our record and near record snowfall last winter there is much interest locally on the characteristics of heavy run-off likely to happen into early summer. The below numbers and dates from Rob Van Kirk apply specifically for the Henry's Fork watershed although the concepts apply to others and provide information on what impacts the nature of run-off)

Precipitation in May was about 50% of average, but temperatures were near average, preserving most of the high-elevation snow all the way through the month.

- Snow remaining in the watershed at elevations above 7,000 feet was almost twice the median amount on June 1.
-
- Warm temperatures are leading to increased streamflows in the Henry's Lake basin as well as in Fall River and Teton River.
-
- Fall River and Teton River will peak in early June but supply enough water to meet irrigation demand through the month of June
-
- Island Park Reservoir is 100% full, and outflow will roughly follow natural inflow as it gradually drops from 850 cfs now to around 500 cfs by July 1.

Rob Van Kirk joined the Henry's Fork Foundation as a senior scientist in 2012. Rob has fished the river since 1977, and helped define HFF's work as the Foundation's first research director from 1994 to 1998 before pursuing an academic career. Rob grew up in Arcata, California and received a B.A. and M.S. from Humboldt University. He holds a Ph.D in mathematics from the University of Utah, where he focused on mathematical modeling of fish and wildlife populations. He is a past recipient of HFF's Conservation Award and the Idaho Chapter of the American Fisheries Society's Native Fish Conservationist of the Year Award. Rob and his wife, Sheryl, live in Ashton.

Montana Aquatic Invasive Species Pass

As of May 15th all anglers fishing in Montana must purchase an Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Pass in addition to standard fishing and conservation licenses. Passes are available from all licenses agents (Jimmy's included) or MTFWP web site. Cost is \$2 for residents, \$15 for non-residents.



Canyon Creek Conservation Project

For the 29th consecutive year the Snake River Cutthroats conducted a springtime conservation project in the Salmon/Lemhi River drainage. This year's project was on Canyon Creek, a Lemhi River tributary east of Leadore. This is the fourth project that the Cutthroats have done on Canyon Creek and the 11th year that we have worked on the Leadore Ranger District. This project is part of a Forest Service five-year plan to restore four miles of Canyon Creek. Canyon Creek was reconnected to the Lemhi a few years ago, which will ultimately restore previously lost spawning habitat for anadromous fish as well as provide improved habitat for resident trout. Spring time weather at 6,000+ feet can be a challenge, but this year's weather was pretty nice.

Forest Service fish technician Nate Quisser had designed 20 in-stream structures for the project. We also planted a few Willows at some disturbed sites to stabilize the bank and ultimately provide shade and



cover. We finished all the sites by mid-afternoon and returned to the Smokey Cub campground to prepare and enjoy the traditional steak bbq and “Ma’s” dutch oven spuds.

Recipe of the Month

Fish and Chips

Ingredients

For the Chips:

- 3 medium russet potatoes (1 1/4 pounds)

- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- Pinch of cayenne pepper
- Kosher salt

For the Fish:

- Olive oil cooking spray

- 2 3/4 cups crispy rice cereal
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 3 large egg whites
- 1.5 pounds skinned, boned whitefish, or South Fork 'bow, cut into 2x4-inch pieces
- Tartar sauce and/or malt vinegar, for serving

Directions

Position racks in the upper and lower thirds of the oven and preheat to 450 degrees F using the convection setting, if available. Place a baking sheet on one of the racks to preheat.

Prepare the chips: Cut the potatoes into 1/4-inch-thick sticks. Toss with the olive oil and cayenne in a bowl. Carefully remove the hot baking sheet from the oven, add the potatoes and spread in an even layer. Use a rubber spatula to scrape any oil from the bowl over the potatoes. Bake on the top oven rack, turning once, until browned and crisp, 25 to 30 minutes. Season with salt.

Meanwhile, make the fish: Set a wire rack on a baking sheet and coat with cooking spray. Lightly crush the cereal in a bowl with your fingers. Add 2 teaspoons salt, and black pepper to taste. In another bowl, whisk the egg whites and a pinch of salt until frothy.

Dip the fish in the egg whites, then roll in the cereal crumbs to coat. Place the fish pieces on the rack (position them on their sides so that the majority of the crust is exposed) and mist with cooking spray.

Bake the fish on the bottom oven rack until crisp and just cooked through, about 12 minutes. Season with salt and black pepper. Serve the fish and chips with tartar sauce and/or malt vinegar, if desired.

Fly of the Month

WR-16

Wood Road-16, going west off the Mesa Falls Scenic Highway leads to a beautiful and fly-fishing famous reach of the Henry's Fork. Situated on Harriman East, this part of the river was one of Bing Lempke's favorite places to fish the river. He followed the sequence of mayflies emerging from the river, and created this pattern intended to be used, simply by changing its size, to match whatever mayfly species emerged at a given time. He named this emerger pattern WR-16 to honor the road leading to this great Henry's Fork location for fly-fishing. Try Bing's easily tied WR-16 during current PMD and flav emergences on the river.

Hook: Mustad 94840, or equiv., size 14-20
 Thread: Black 8/0
 Tail: a few hen grizzly fibers
 Body: Olive Antron
 Thorax: Yellow Antron
 Hackle: Sparse hen grizzly
