
A Message from the President by Rory Cullen

Public Casting Clinic

These will be held Tuesday, May 16th and Thursday, May 18th from 6:30 to 8:30 PM at Tautphaus Park south of the fountain (at corner of South Boulevard and Rogers Street). Spring Conservation Project, May 20th

The Snake River Cutthroats 29th consecutive spring conservation project is scheduled for Saturday May 20th. This year's project is again on Canyon Creek, a small Lemhi River tributary stream east of Leadore where we worked the last two years and also in 2013. It's roughly 120 miles to Leadore, or just under 2 hours. We will be building 20 in-stream log structures, similar to what we've done before. Hip boots are more than adequate for anyone working in-stream. Chest waders are handy if it rains. A sturdy pair of work boots and gloves would be helpful for anyone not working in-stream. The weather is unpredictable, so plan accordingly. The preliminary plan is to camp at the BLM Smokey Cub Campground 2.5 - 3 miles east of Leadore along Highway 29, which is the road to Montana. There is good parking for trailers and campers, as well as good spots for tents. There are toilets at the campground, but no potable water. The club provides breakfast on Saturday and Sunday, as well as lunch and dinner on Saturday. There is an informal potluck dinner on Friday night. The work site is another 5 miles further east (upstream). I just wanted to get this on everyone's calendar. 

Odd Fish - Keep or Release? By Dan Garren, Regional Fisheries Biologist

It seems that every year, we get a couple phone calls from anglers who caught an odd fish in an area where it doesn't naturally occur. Most calls are from anglers who released those fish back into the water, and are now wondering if that was a good idea or not. As most anglers know, it is illegal to transport live fish from one waterbody to another. Species introductions that are not thoroughly evaluated and well thought out can have grave consequences on the fish communities that already reside in an area. Yet, every year, we see instances where this occurs. Look no further than Becker Pond in Ryder Park to see evidence of this. We now have yellow perch in the pond, but we have no great forage base to support those fish. We also have goldfish that have bred, and populated the pond with their offspring, which cloud up the once-clear water with their feeding behavior. While some fish introductions are clearly the work of well-intended citizens, others are actually the result of fish being washed out of upstream areas, and then being encountered in other downstream waters. For example, Lake trout are found in Palisades Reservoir, but on very rare occasions can be found in the South Fork and points downstream. Anglers have caught lake trout as far down as below Gem Lake following high water years. The likely origins of those fish are upstream reservoirs. When anglers catch these oddball species in areas where they are not commonly found, it is best (where legal) to remove that fish and take it home to eat. By doing so, the chances of a new species becoming established are reduced. This helps protect our existing fisheries. Stay abreast of the fishing rules where you frequently fish. When you encounter an odd fish, take pictures before taking the fish home to dinner. Contact your local IDFG office to confirm and document your catch. We can all work together to protect the high-quality resources we share.









Recipe of the Month

Yellow Perch Filets

You can find these exotic, but excellent eating fish in several of our regional reservoirs. They seem mostly encountered through ice fishing, but by concentrating efforts in warmer still waters they populate, you will encounter them in summertime.

Ingredients

- \square 1/2 cup butter, melted
- □ 2/3 cup crushed saltine crackers
- □ 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- □ 1/2 teaspoon dried basil
- ✓ 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- □ 1/2 teaspoon salt
- □ 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- □ 1 pound yellow perch fillets
- ☐ Add all ingredients to list

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2. Pour butter into a shallow dish. Combine cracker crumbs, Parmesan cheese, basil, oregano, salt, and garlic powder in a separate shallow bowl.
- 3. Dip perch fillets into melted butter and press into the seasoned cracker crumbs to coat. Arrange coated fillets on a baking sheet.
- 4. Bake in the preheated oven until the coating is browned and fish flakes easily with a fork, 25 to 30 minutes.

Footnote

 The nutrition data for this recipe includes the full amount of the butter and breading ingredients. The actual amount of butter and breading consumed will vary.





Fly of the Month

Doll Hair Thunder Creek

Bob Bean was a renowned fly fisher and fly tier from Blackfoot. From the 1960s into the 1990s he taught fly-fishing and fly tying out of the B&B Bait Shop. He was also one of the first local tiers to use synthetics in tying flies. He offered this pattern, a variation of Keith Fulsher's Thunder Creek pattern using doll hair for the wing. Bob did not have the present day variety of winging material we now enjoy. His pattern became a local favorite for encountering large trout, so he and family members tied it by the dozen to meet demand. Bob was also the first person to receive the Snake River Cutthroat's Heritage Award, bestowed posthumously.

Hook: Daiichi 1750, or equiv., size 1-4

Thread: Black 6/o

Body: Gold or silver sparkle braid

Wing: Black or brown over orange or white doll hair

Head: Bullet style from doll hair used to form wing, sealed with nail

polish then eyes painted in place.
