

## House of Harrop is 2015 Recipient of the Snake River Cutthroats Heritage Award

"For significant and sustained commitment and contributions to the art of fly tying and the sport of fly fishing, to the conservation of critical fish habitat, and to the promotion of fly fishing ethics in Eastern Idaho."

In existence for nearly a half-century, the House of Harrop is certainly synonymous with fly tying, fly fishing, contribution to fly-fishing literature, and exquisite artwork. The House of Harrop, begun by Rene' and Bonnie Harrop in their St. Anthony home in 1968, has included their daughter Leslie and son Shayne from early ages, and now includes a third generation of Harrops.

Rene' Harrop, a life-long resident of Fremont County, is a renowned angler, tyer, artist, and author. He and the House of Harrop was, remains, and always will be stalwart advocates for protecting the Henry's Fork when many others are more interested in the number and the size of the fish they could catch. Rene' was a founding member of the Upper Snake River Fly-Fishers (the Rexburg club for many of us) and served as its first president. He was also a founding member of the Henry's Fork Foundation and a long-time supporter. When Trout Unlimited launched their Home Rivers Initiative on the South Fork, The House of Harrop pledged one of Rene'signature prints to the Eastern Idaho Fly Tying and Fly-Fishing Expo's live auction to support this effort for each of the first five years of the program.

This generosity and commitment to the sport of fly fishing, the art of fly tying, fly-fishing art and literature, and the protection of the fishing resource is a hallmark and ongoing House of Harrop characteristic. The House of Harrop runs true to its roots. In an industry that is now dominated by mass produced flies from overseas, the House of Harrop maintains the tradition of individual quality and innovation with tying materials and creative life cycle patterns with their elegant custom tied flies.

### Henry's Lake Hybrids: A New Strain <sup>by</sup> Jon Flinders, Fisheries Biologist

Henrys Lake, located in eastern Idaho, has provided a recreational trout fishery since the late 1800s. The lake supports a robust fishery for native Yellowstone cutthroat trout, hybrid cutthroat trout (female cutthroat trout x male rainbow trout), and brook trout. For over 60 years, Henrys Lake has been managed as a trophy trout fishery. Anglers often refer to the hybrid cutthroat trout as "cuttbows" or "hybrids." Hybrids grow faster and attain larger sizes than the native cutthroat trout, which makes it popular among anglers. Hybrids were first stocked in the lake in the 1950s in relatively low numbers (5,000 and 8,000 fish), but current hatchery goals call for 200,000 hybrids annually. To ensure genetic integrity of the native Yellowstone cutthroat trout population, all hybrids are sterilized prior to stocking. Hybrids are stocked in the fall in the lake as three inch fish known as "fingerlings." Hybrid cutthroat trout production is usually done with early-run cutthroat trout females collected from Hatchery Creek egg-taking station located on the north shores of the lake. Eggs are stripped on site and fertilized with milt obtained from male rainbow trout. Historically, male rainbow trout milt has been collected from rainbow trout from Hayspur State Fish Hatchery, located 30 miles south of Sun Valley. We refer to the hybrids created with fish from the Hayspur hatchery as the "Hayspur strain." This spring, milt from male rainbow trout known as the "Gerrard strain" was used. It originally came from Kootenay Lake, British Columbia. The Gerrard strain was introduced to Idaho in 1941 and 1942 in northern Idaho's Lake Pend Oreille. In northern Idaho, Gerrard rainbows reach very large sizes and are known to be highly piscivorous, meaning they like to eat other fish. In Lake Pend Oreille, the Gerrard strain has reached large sizes with a world record 37 lb fish being caught there in 1949. Henrys Lake may be an ideal location for the Gerrard strain given the relative availability of prey fish, such as sculpin and Utah chub. Along with that, the high lake productivity allows for fast fish growth. In the fall of 2015, Idaho Department of Fish and Game will stock approximately 100,000 "Hayspur strain" hybrids and 100,000 "Gerrard strain" hybrids. Prior to stocking, all hybrid fingerlings will be marked with a colored dye that imbeds into the fish scales. The dye does not harm the fish or make the fish harmful to eat, but it will help biologists draw a comparison between the Hayspur and Gerrard strains to evaluate how these different stocks perform in Henrys Lake. A few of the questions we hope to answer are: 1) Do the different strains grow at different rates? 2) Is one strain more aggressive at eating other fish such as the Utah chub? 3) Does one strain attain larger size or live longer than the other? The results from this evaluation will likely be used to guide future stocking efforts in order to provide a hybrid trout best suited to providing a trophy fishery that anglers have come to expect in Henrys Lake.

### **Recipe of the Month**

**Carol Staples' Brookies & Hush Puppies** 

Our membership chairperson is a North Carolina country girl. That means a fish fry once in a while is in order. When that time comes up, I run out to a headwater stream somewhere and get a bunch of brookies to become the essential ingredient. Those aggressive little devils, ranging from six to ten inches, take anything. I like to give 'em a small (#12) peacock woolly worm. Doing so is almost as much fun as enjoying the results of her recipe. After landing enough of these for dinner, and keeping them alive, I clean them all at same time and immediately place them in a cooler and head for home. Then after a few trips to the grocery store to replenish other items given below, she takes over as follows.

<u>Ingredients for Fish</u> Cleaned trout, four, five or six per person Salt & pepper (optional) Solid Crisco Corn Meal

**Cooking Instructions** 

Roll each fish in corn meal with salt and pepper to totally cover outer surface Melt solid Crisco at medium cooking temperature in a cast iron skillet Place as many as will fit in the heated skillet Cook fish turning occasionally until meat easily leaves bones when probed with a fork Remove from skillet and place on paper towels

#### **Hush Puppies Ingredients**

2 ¼ cups corn meal
2-3 tablespoons chopped onion
1 ½ cups buttermilk (enough to moisten flour & corn meal)
1 tsp salt
¾ tsp soda
Canola oil
Makes 3-4 dz.

<u>Cooking Instructions</u> Mix well cornmeal; chopped onions, salt, soda, buttermilk to form stock Dip into stock to form teaspoon size chunks Heat Canola oil to 375 Deg. F in deep fryer such as Fry Baby Drop byteaspoon full into deep fryer Cook until golden brown Remove and dry on paper towel

Serve both while still warm. Include cole slaw and you will have a fabulous dinner!

### Fly of the Month

### Peacock Woolly Worm

I mentioned above in Recipe of the Month that a peacock woolly worm was my "go to" fly for fooling headwater brookies when planning a fish fry. Peacock herl is the main attracting item here, so hackle choice is up to you. Those aggressive devils will chew this fly up quickly, so applying the "KISS" principle means a stock of them can be quickly tied. Don't use your best quality hackle, and be sure to reinforce the herl by winding it tightly around the tying thread, then forming the body with the result. Your fly will stay together better if you counter-wrap the wound hackle with a fine wire rib.

Hook:	Daiichi 1710, size 10-14, or equiv.	
Thread:	Olive or black Uni-Thread 8/0	
Optional rib: Fine copper wire (adds durability)		
Body:	Tightly wound reinforced peacock herl	
Hackle:	Grizzly, ginger, badger, or whatever
