Proposed License Fee Increase by James E White, Upper Snake Region Supervisor Idaho Department of Fish and Game

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game (IDF&G) is moving forward with a license fee increase proposal to the 2017 legislature. IDFG's operational costs increased over 22% just from inflation since the 2005 resident fee increase. Due to budget constraints, we have already cut services the past several years. Now we need more funding, or we will cut deeper into what we can provide and manage in Idaho. The license fee increase bill will include a 20% increase in the resident and nonresident daily fishing license and consecutive daily fishing license. . It will also include about a 20% increase in fees for all other resident licenses, tags, and permits. The Price Lock concept is part of this proposal. This means Idahoans with a valid 2017 license including annual hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses; sportsman packages; and valid three-year licenses will be exempt from the fee increase on maintaining a valid annual license each year for at least the next three years. The expected fiscal effect from this proposal could generate about \$2.2 million in revenue. IDFG does not receive any general tax revenue. Nonresident fees were increased not too long ago in 2008. I hope you will offer support this winter for this proposal.

Reinvigorating Yellowstone Cutthroat Trout Populations in Rainey Creek by Brett High, Regional Fisheries Biologist

(The Snake River Cutthroats have invested considerable resources in efforts to improve cutthroat trout spawning habitat and flow in Rainy Creek. However, compared to other South Fork tributaries, this creek remains far behind in productivity. IDF&G has research activities to define causes and to identify actions that can improve this situation. The below discussion and tables should be of interest to all of us.)

Rainey Creek Cutthroat Trout spawning run sizes continue to lag behind runs in the other tributaries Despite being the South Fork Snake River's tributary with the largest drainage area (76 mi²),. This trend has been observed since 2001 despite many fish restoration efforts in Rainey Creek. In 2016, 19 Cutthroat were captured at the Rainey Creek weir while runs at the other three main tributaries ranged from 958 to 3240 cutthroat trout. As such, there is much room for improvement to recover fluvial Yellowstone Cutthroat Trout in this important spawning tributary.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game is initiating a research and monitoring effort starting in 2017 to identify limiting factors for cutthroat trout in Rainey Creek, and whether supplementation (stocking of eyed eggs) could be used to speed up recovery. Issues we believe are worth looking at include evaluating connectivity and passage both upstream and downstream for adult and juvenile cutthroat trout; estimating survival rates for young cutthroat migrating down through Rainey Creek; and efforts to increase returns of adult cutthroat in future years by stocking eyed eggs to "jump start" the fluvial population. All these questions will be addressed starting this spring by using a combination of radio tagging and tracking, stocking of eyed eggs, and fish trapping efforts for juvenile trout using a variety of fish traps.

This work will be a major undertaking in Rainey Creek and will provide a variety of volunteer opportunities for those wishing to take part. Opportunities to volunteer include assisting IDFG during spawner collection (mid-June), weir operation and radio tagging (June), fry trapping (July – Oct), and backpack electrofishing (July – Sep).

Bud Lilly Helped Establish Our Club

Bud Lilly the angler, author, shop owner, catch and release advocate, and someone who convinced Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks Department to stop stocking in Montana trout streams, passed peacefully in his sleep Wednesday, January 4th in Bozeman, Montana. He was surrounded by his family. Bud was 92 and a WWII veteran in the Pacific theatre, conservation advocate, fly-fishing retailer, school teacher, author, and guide. Those of us that remember Bud Lilly's Trout shop will never forget his sincere welcome, friendly service, quality merchandise, and solid information. Many folks will sorely miss his guidance on the stream. He has forgotten more about trout fishing in Montana than any fly-fisher should ever hope to know. We will miss his stories about experiences in WWII along with those about his fishing exploits and his efforts to promote Montana wild trout populations.

Back in the early 1970s, Dr. Jim McCue, founder of our club, enlisted Bud and the Lilly family to conduct the indoor session of our first springtime free public fly casting clinic. This event took place in 1973 at Idaho Falls Recreation Center. Within it, Bud and family members instructed in fly rod casting technique and in fly rod selection. From there the clinic moved to outdoor sessions at Tautphaus Park. The Lilly's offered the indoor activity for a number of years, and Lilly family participation in this event helped put the Snake River Cutthroats into public awareness. From this indoor session club members would conduct the outdoor sessions at Tautphaus Park. This event continues each year with club members and special guests, including Bob Jacklin for who Bud gave a fly-fishing start, conducting the outdoor sessions and is the longest running event the Snake River Cutthroats offer to the public.

Recipe of the Month

Baked Parmesan Yellow Perch

Not native to this region, yellow perch nevertheless have established good populations in some of our still waters. In some of these they grow to a bit more than a foot long. They can be caught on flies during warm months, but they seem to be more encountered through ice fishing. That being the case, now seems like the best time to offer a recipe for cooking them.

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons dry bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1 pound perch or fish fillets of your choice
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted

Directions

In a shallow bowl, combine the bread crumbs, Parmesan cheese, paprika and basil. Brush fish fillets with butter, then dip into the crumb mixture. Place in a greased baking pan. Bake, uncovered, at 500° for 10 minutes or until fish flakes easily with a fork.

Quarter pound: 158 calories, 6g fat (2g saturated fat), 52mg cholesterol, 176mg sodium, 4g carbohydrate (0 sugars, 1g fiber), 23g protein.

Prep/Total Time: 20 min. Serves four





Fly of the Month

Henry's Fork Stonefly Nymph

This Mike Lawson pattern has been around for decades. As can be seen from its name, the dense stonefly population of Mike's home river inspired its creation. It is made from readily available materials, easily tied, and proven effective when dead drifted along the bottom of streams hosting big stoneflies. We are getting closer to the months when dead drifting stonefly nymphs along the bottom of the Henry's Fork in many locations is effective. Here is another stonefly nymph pattern to try.

Hook: Mustad 37160, or equiv., size 4-68

Thread: Black, 6/0

Tail: Forked black crow quill fibers

Abdomen: Black Chenille Thorax: Brown chenille Wing case: Black Chenille

Hackle: Black saddle palmered over thorax
